BOLDYTH LEADERSHIP STANDARDS

As BoldYTH leaders, we set the standard for the next generation. Our lives speak louder than our words, and the way we live either draws students toward Christ or pushes them away. These disciplines and values define who we are, how we lead, and how we build a culture where students can encounter Jesus.

SPIRITUAL SHARPNESS

Students follow leaders who *live* their faith. What we say matters less than how we live —our language, our posts, and what we consume reflect our walk with Christ. To lead well, we must prioritize prayer, fasting, and time in the Word, staying sensitive to God's voice. Breakthroughs in students' lives begin in our private devotion.

Values Connected to Spiritual Sharpness:

- **Excellence** Eliminate distractions and pursue a culture that honors God.
- **Humble** Lead with an "I get to" mindset, serving others with the gifts God has given.
- **Learner** Continually grow in wisdom and leadership, following Jesus' example.

ACCOUNTABILITY

We are better together. Leaders must be honest about struggles—spiritual, emotional, financial, or otherwise—and seek support. Every leader should have accountability with a Pastor or Bgroup leader, and your Campus Youth Director should know who that is.

Values Connected to Accountability:

- Order Lead your personal life well (family, finances, commitments). A life in order builds credibility.
- **Honor** Respect the standards set before you and handle concerns by bringing them to the right people.

DISCIPLESHIP

We are disciples who make disciples. We cannot pour into others if we are not being poured into ourselves. A disciple is more than a convert—they are actively growing to imitate Christ. Discipleship happens through teaching, modeling, and doing life together, combining invitation (relationship) with challenge (accountability and growth).

Values Connected to Discipleship:

- Multiplier Raise up others to lead and invest in students so more lives can be reached.
- **Communicator** Cast vision clearly and communicate expectations; unspoken expectations will never be met.

COMMUNICATION & PUNCTUALITY

We honor God and our team by showing up on time, prepared, and staying until the job is done. If you're late or unable to attend, notify your Campus Youth Director in advance. Clear and proactive communication builds unity—frustrations should always be brought to leadership directly, never through gossip. Healthy communication strengthens our team and protects our culture. Excessive miscommunication may result in a meeting with your Youth Director and/or removal from Bold Leadership.

Values Connected to Communication & Punctuality:

• **Initiative** – Take ownership, step up, and make things better without waiting to be asked.

Countenance – Lead with excellence in appearance, attitude, and approachability.

Scripture Standard

BETHANY CHURCH POLICIES

BETHANY LEADER HONOR CODE

As a leader in the Bethany Church family, you have a wonderful opportunity to embody and share the values of mature Christian living, reflecting the love and grace of Christ Jesus (see Ephesians 5:1–33). In your role as a Bethany leader, you are encouraged to consistently present yourself in a way that aligns with biblical principles, both in appearance and behavior. Your example is a powerful testament to your faith and a positive reflection of Christ.

Your commitment to Christ involves demonstrating the highest standards of personal conduct, which includes maintaining a disciplined life of Bible reading, prayer, and fasting. As a leader, you are invited to embrace a lifestyle that avoids activities such as:

- Profanity
- Gambling
- Alcohol consumption
- Tobacco use
- Unethical practices
- Illegal drugs

- Pornography
- Sexual immorality
- Any and all behavior that might cause the Holy Spirit to be grieved and others to stumble including misuse of social media

By steering clear of these behaviors, you uphold the values that honor Christ and support the spiritual growth of others.

Your role as a leader is a profound expression of your heart's commitment and is reflected in your actions. Viewing this honor code as a valuable aspect of your spiritual journey, you contribute positively to the growth of those around you and encourage them to follow in Christ's footsteps as servant leaders. If you have any questions about the honor code or need guidance, a Bethany pastor is always available to support you.

MISCONDUCT PREVENTION POLICY

- Two-Adult Rule: We avoid situations where a student is ever alone with just one adult.
- Open Door Policy: Doors stay open unless there's a window for visibility.
- **Bathroom Guidelines:** Only women assist younger kids, and all bathroom trips are supervised with clear protocols.
- Check-in/out Procedures: Every child (7th grade and under) must be securely checked in and picked up with their unique security tag.
- **Sick Policy:** If your child is sick (fever, vomiting, contagious symptoms), we kindly ask you to keep them home so everyone stays healthy.
- No Medication: We don't administer meds unless it's a life-threatening situation. We ensure our Bold Staff Team is CPR certified; however, Youth Directors will actively pursue parental consent when dealing with minors and emergencies.
- Accident Protocols: Parents are notified immediately if injuries occur and reports are filed.
- Mandated Reporting: If abuse or neglect is ever suspected, our staff members
 are trained and required to report it to the proper authorities immediately. We
 take these steps seriously and follow all legal and church protocols to protect
 the children in our care.

LEADING GROUPS IN BOLDYTH

BOLD GROUPS

At BoldYTH, small groups (Bold Groups) are the heartbeat of discipleship. As a leader, your role is to model Christ, create healthy environments, and help students grow in their relationship with God. This guide will walk you from getting started to leading your own group with confidence.

STEP 1. GETTING STARTED

Connect – Meet with your Campus Youth Director to talk about the group you'd like to lead this semester. They will set you up in the Planning Center so you can manage your group.

Prepare – Cover your group in prayer. Start inviting students personally—at church, in the lobby, during altar calls, through friends, at school, or at work. Follow up with reminders and take a step of faith to launch!

STEP 2. FUNDAMENTALS OF A BOLD GROUP

The Win – Every student feels seen, known, and discipled toward Christ.

What is a Disciple?

A disciple is any believer in Christ who follows in his teachings and demonstrates
his character. However, it is helpful to differentiate between a "convert" and a
"disciple." A convert is one who simply believes in Jesus, and a disciple is
someone who has devoted him- or herself to the progressive work of becoming
more like Christ. Every Christian is called to be a disciple of Christ.

What is Discipleship?

- Discipleship is not a deeper Bible study; it's Christ-centered multiplication. It's building relationships and reproducing the life of Christ in others.
- Walking with students, teaching them to obey Jesus, and modeling a Spirit-led lifestyle.
- Not just coffee meetups or "deep talks"—it's consistent, Christ-centered multiplication.

Marks of a Disciple – Devotional life, community in the local church, submission to spiritual authority, generosity, sanctification, Bible study, confession/repentance, serving, Spirit-filled living, and a missional lifestyle.

STEP 3. BGROUP GUIDELINES

- 1. Show up prepared
- 2. Keep every group discussion Christ-centered
- 3. Take the main points through the S.O.A.P. method
 - a. Scripture, Observation, Application, and Prayer
- 4. **Pray** together every meeting
- 5. **Honor the timeframe** your Youth Director has set
- 6. Track attendance and members in Planning Center

STEP 4. YOUR FIRST SMALL GROUP

Checklist Before You Lead

- Confirm with your Campus Youth Director about what group you're leading.
- Invite students personally.
- Make sure new students know when and where Bold Groups are at your campus.
- Be familiar with the Bold Groups topic and small group questions.
- Pray that God would use you in a unique way before you lead.

Bold Groups Run Sheet

Leader Huddle

- Arrive on time to meet with the team
- Pray together and set up for the night
- Ensure your assigned task is prepped and ready

Welcome Students

- Connect with students as they arrive
- Check in all students using an iPad / PCO Check-ins App
- Create a fun, life-giving atmosphere

Activities / Worship / Word

- Participate fully and engage with students
- Lead by example modeling authentic worship
- Listen attentively and take notes
- Capture key points for small group discussion

Bold Groups

Work through the S.O.A.P. method

- Scripture, Observation, Application, and Prayer
- Recommunicate the main idea / passage of Scripture
- Ask guiding questions and lead discussion

Leader Debrief

- Quick team debrief after all students have been picked up
- Celebrate wins and prepare for the next week
- Share any upcoming announcements with the team

STEP 5. LEADING A GREAT DISCUSSION

- **Start light:** Use icebreakers or casual conversation to build connections.
- Ask follow-ups: Go deeper with meaningful, relevant questions.
- Give space: Silence is okay; let's students think.
- **Refocus gently:** Guide back to the topic if conversation drifts.
- End with encouragement: Always finish with hope and strength.

Dealing with Challenges

- Come prepared with enough questions. All of our discussions need to revolve around Christ as the focus.
- Set expectations early. Explain the dynamic of the group and use your time to build relationships with the students.
- Handle distractions calmly, but firmly. Confidence is key.
- End every conversation on a positive note. Always have a moment of encouragement or strengthening.

STEP 6. CREATING A HEALTHY CULTURE

- Celebrate wins. Birthdays, praise reports, milestones.
- Stay connected outside of Bold Groups. Sit together on Sundays, plan hangouts, serve together.
- Make students feel known. Learn their names, notice first-timers, call out giftings you see.
- Encourage students to serve and lead even before they are "perfect".

STEP 7. SALVATION MOMENTS WITH STUDENTS

Be ready and sensitive to the Holy Spirit. If a student shows interest, lean in.

• Keep it simple:

- God created us and loves us.
- Sin separates us from God.

- Jesus came, died, and rose again to restore our relationship with God.
- Through faith and repentance, we receive forgiveness and new life.
- Invite them to respond: Ask them to pray and accept Jesus.
- Lead them in prayer:
 - o Repent of sin. Confess your sin. Make Jesus Savior and Lord.

Romans 10:9 (ESV) says, "If you confess with your mouth that JESUS IS LORD and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."

- Celebrate big: This is the greatest decision they'll ever make!
- **Encourage next steps:** Water baptism at their campus. Follow up to get them signed up online.
- **Follow up:** Let your Youth Director know so the student can be discipled and supported in their new walk with Christ.

"Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Matthew 28:19-20 NLT

STEP 8. WEEKENDS AT BETHANY

BoldYTH leaders are part of the whole church family.

- Attend weekend services on campus consistently.
- Arrive 15 minutes early and stay 15 minutes after your weekend service to connect with students.
- Consistent absence from weekend services can lead to removal from leadership.

STEP 9. HANGING OUT WITH STUDENTS

- Partner with parents always get approval!
- Never be alone with a student of the opposite sex.
- Always meet in groups with more than one adult.
- Keep environments safe and life-giving (music, movies, conversations).
- Daytime hangouts are preferred; evening activities should end by 9:00 PM.

WHY SHOULD YOU MAKE DISCIPLES?

"And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:19–20 ESV).

You should make disciples because all authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Jesus

Jesus' authority speaks of two things:

1. Our submission to Him

a. Jesus has authority over our lives. When we explicitly say, "He is Lord," we implicitly say, "I am not." We are submitted to Him. He doesn't command us to go get jobs, get married, pursue an education, obtain success, earn money, start a family, or buy a house, but for many of us, that has become the pursuit. Culture commands us to pursue those things, but Christ commands us to make disciples. If you're going to obtain those things but are not going to make disciples, you are not submitted to Jesus. He is not your Lord.

2. Our commission from Him

a. We can't just randomly pull another car over on the highway. It's not because we're not smart enough, strong enough, old enough, tall enough, experienced enough, etc. It's because we haven't been given the authority to do so by the law. That authority must be conferred onto a citizen by a higher authority. In a similar fashion, Jesus gives us authority in our lives. He is the higher authority that confers on us the authority to make disciples. You've been commissioned. You're not stepping out in your own authority— you're stepping out in His authority.

PRACTICAL DISCIPLESHIP

You're a relational leader: As you disciple students, build genuine, loving relationships with them. Empower them to follow Christ and God's Word. Everything should be done in the spirit of love and honor. Do not lord over students, judge them harshly, parent them, or disqualify them.

You're an encouraging leader: Lift up students emotionally, spiritually, and physically. Even if they have done something wrong or are in an unfortunate situation, stand with them and encourage them.

You're a Spirit-led leader: God is your focus and His Word is your standard. Follow Him and His Word with passion and zeal. Don't let your own preferences divert you from God's Word. Also, listen to God's voice as He speaks to you concerning your students.

HANDLING DIFFICULT SITUATIONS

As a BoldYTH, you'll walk with students through the highs and lows of life — including difficult and even traumatic moments. You are in a trusted role, but always remember:

You are a leader first, not just a friend.

You are also a **mandatory reporter** for **any illegal activity** involving students. Below is a breakdown of how to respond in both **non-legal** and **legal** situations.

Nonlegal Situations

We are not required by law to report these, but we do care deeply. Examples include: Gambling, Smoking/vaping, Drinking, Premarital sex, Suicidal thoughts, Harmful or risky behavior.

What To Do:

- Inform your Youth Director as soon as you're aware. Don't wait.
- If the situation becomes serious, we'll help the student communicate with their parents or guardians.

Encouraging Student/Parent Communication:

Within 24 hours of the student opening up:

- Encourage them to talk to their parents or guardians.
- They can do this:
 - On their own (we will follow up with parents afterward), or
 - With a Bold leader present for support.

The goal is **open**, **honest**, **and healthy communication** between students and families.

Following Up

- Some students come from strong, faith-filled homes. Others do not.
- Regardless of background, we walk with students through every season.

- Stay present even when it's tough.
- If a parent is uninvolved or unavailable, we still show the love, support, and trustworthiness of the church.

Always update your campus Youth Director about serious matters. **Never** carry heavy information alone.

Legal Situations and Authorities

These MUST be reported immediately — no exceptions. Examples include:

- Abuse (physical, sexual, emotional)
- Abandonment or neglect
- Any serious threat to a student's safety

Your Responsibility:

If you come across an issue like this, report it immediately to your youth director, and that director will help you report it to the proper authorities. Although your campus youth director will help, it is legally your responsibility to report abuse, neglect, or the immediate danger of a student. This should take place no longer than an hour after disclosure. If your campus youth director isn't available, please contact your campus pastor immediately.

CREATING YOUR BOLD GROUP


You will receive an email from Bethany Church and BoldYTH titled "You are now a Leader of (Group Name)

STEP 1. SETTING UP YOUR GROUP

The first time you log in to Groups, you may or may not need to set a password, depending on if you have previously set a password for one of our other apps.

On the login page, select the *Need a* password? link below the email and password fields.

Enter the email address your administrator used to set up your profile, then a verification code will be sent to that email address. After entering the code, you will be able to create a password and then log in.



YOUR GROUP IS NOW READY

Once you create a password, you will be logged into your group. You can also access your group by opening the email *You are now a Leader of (Group Name)* and click *View Group*. You can also **Bookmark/Save** your **Planning Center Login Link** on your phone for easy access. https://accounts.planningcenteronline.com/login/new

However, the best thing to do is download the "Church Center" app to quickly view your groups all in one place.


STEP 2. ADDING MEMBERS & ACCEPTING MEMBERSHIP REQUEST.

The first page you see when you select your group is a list of all your members. There are some quick actions you can take on this page, such as emailing members, removing them from your group, or printing a list of members.

You will also have the option to add new members from this page if your administrator has given you the permission to do so.

Adding Members: Type a person's name into the Add a member field and select their name when it appears. If they don't yet exist in the database, select Create a new member to add them to your database.

Accepting or Rejecting
Membership Request: When someone requests to join your group, you will receive an email notification. You can either respond via the link in that email or respond from Groups. All requests will be displayed on top of your list of members.




STEP 3. ADDING EVENTS & ATTENDANCE

EVENTS & MEETINGS

The Events tab shows you a calendar of upcoming events for your group, along with some quick actions you can take on each event. Once you select an event, you will see more details about that event, along with the option to edit the event.

BoldYTH Staff will already have added major events in your groups event page. From the event list,



you can request RSVPs from your members for upcoming events and quickly view the responses.

ATTENDANCE


Attendance can be a key indicator of group health. Attendance for BoldYTH B-Groups is one of the most important things you do as a B-Group Leader. When group leaders take regular attendance at group events, BoldYTH Staff will know if the group has grown too large or become too small.



A group's Events tab shows the attendance status for each event. Events are listed in chronological order and show the date, name, and attendance if it's already been taken.

Click Report Attendance to be taken directly to the attendance roster.

You can also select the event and Click *Record Attendance* in the event page to access the attendance roster.




In the Attendance Report, put a check next to members who were present, and search for others who attended and want to be added as a member. To modify attendance for an event, go to the event page, and click *Modify* in the Attendance section.

Make any needed adjustments in the Attendance Report, and then click *Submit Attendance Report* to submit the change.

If your group didn't meet, click *Actually, We Didn't Meet* at the bottom of the screen, and then submit the report.

STEP 4. SETTINGS

From the Settings tab, group leaders can modify group information such as name, description, and group image. Because BoldYTH organizes its groups in a specific way, we ask leaders not to change the group name, picture, or group information without consulting BoldYTH Staff first. However, leaders can update the contact information as needed.

I will commit to connect with MY 1 / bgroup once a month.

It's simple... just put in effort to connect with a student(s) outside of BoldYTH events and gatherings. It's all about making disciples, and most of that happens outside of the church.
